




# **AREAS**OF INTERVENTION





### 1. A MESSAGE FROM THE RESIDENT REPRESENTATIVE

The year 2023 is the final year of the 8th country program cycle which started in 2019 and required time, continuous efforts and joint dedication from all stakeholders. This year coincides with the approval of the new country program 2024-2027 which aligns with the national priorities and is as inclusive and participatory as possible in such a way to leave no one behind.

Our program aims to transform lives with special attention to the mapping out of a multi sector strategic plan of family planning 2023-2027, the improvement of the supply chain management for family planning and reproductive health products, the coordination of family planning and maternal health interventions to reduce unmet need in family planning, the organization of contraceptive technology mentoring as well as support towards the health information system.

In terms of maternal health, the focus has been on monitoring obstetric and neonatal care in emergencies, building the capacity of providers through mentoring, the surgery campaign for women suffering from obstetric fistulas, their socio-economic reintegration and the post-operative monitoring of women.

In the fight against gender-based violence and harmful practices, the interventions were focused around supporting the coordination of provincial interventions to promote gender equality, prevention through awareness-raising, the response to GBV, the management of GBV cases and socio-economic reintegration of GBV survivors, the distribution of dignity kits to displaced persons and refugee camps, and support for national and international events to promote gender equality, human rights and the fight against GBV.

Notable progress has been made in the area of young people through the provision of services adapted to their needs, capacity-building for children and young people in sexual and reproductive health, and the enhancement of pupils' knowledge and skills in life skills and age-appropriate sexual knowledge through the incorporation of the subject into school curricula.

With regards the organisation of the fourth general census of the population, housing, agriculture and livestock, to support the national planning process, significant results have already been achieved which include the mobilisation of international expertise to strengthen the capacities of the national team, the completion of the major preparatory phases, the pilot mapping, the pilot enumeration, the pilot EPC, the computer equipment and the analysis and processing software as well putting in place the logistics needed to carry out the census. The program places particular emphasis on aspects relating to communication and innovation through social networks, the media and documents that can be easily understood in order to share results and ensure greater awareness and visibility of the organisation's mandate.

These results would not have been possible without the support of our partners from NGOs and the civil society, as well as the contribution of our bilateral and multilateral donors under the leadership of the government. We have succeeded in taking well-targeted action which, despite some persisting challenges, has made it possible to curb the effects of maternal mortality, improve access to family planning and accelerate the fight against gender-based violence. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all these partners for their commitment, the work done and the results achieved as well as the staff of UNFPA Burundi.

The new programme, which starts in 2024, aims to improve the quality of care and services, strengthen national mechanisms and the capacities of institutions and players to combat discriminatory social norms and people, and build the skills and capacities of young people and improve the production and use of data to support their full national planning.

I invite you to join me and celebrate, as I look forward to the renewed commitment of everyone - government, donors, defense, civil society and the private sector - to achieve the objectives set out in this new country programme.

Forced to leave school at 13, she married at 17, became pregnant and developed obstetric fistula after giving birth. Annonciate Nshimirimana lived in shame and isolation isolation for 10 years. Before she could find a cure, her mother suggested that she a sorcerer to find a solution. He gave her potions to swallow, but to no avail but to no avail, as she continues to pass urine and stools involuntarily.

Annonciate is one of those women who dare to talk about it. They are breaking the taboo the ordeal of suffering from obstetric fistula.

"I could dress up to go to mass, because I like to pray. But once I got there, I'd go straight home, because each time I'd realize that during the journey I'd already I'd already soiled my clothes and relieved myself. Oh, what a shame!"


Annonciate, covering her face as she imagines the humiliation. Ten years later, Annonciate learns that she hasn't been cursed, but is in fact suffering a treatable and curable disease. She hears this on the radio and can only rejoice. Today, in good health, she is more than grateful.

How can ICTs be used to empower Muslim women? Women? How can these women also use ICTs to combat gender-based violence (GBV) and promote family planning?

"I have 4 children, the afnic was born in 1985 and the last in 1996. The shortest interval between pregnancies was 3 years, otherwise it was 4 years. You can understand that between two births, I could go about my business and look after my family. Today, we're in 2023, and life is even more expensive and more difficult. The woman we've just portrayed portraying, carrying children everywhere while pregnant, will she go any further?"

Family planning is necessary not only to preserve women's health women's health, but also to enable them to pursue other occupations social and economic development.



Salha Ngendakumana, 16, says she really appreciated the awareness-raising session:

« I learned a lot. I especially understood why I have to concentrate on my studies, and to encourage my friends to do the same do the same, to avoid anything that could distract them and cause them and cause them harm, such as getting pregnant and contracting sexually transmitted diseases. On the other hand, I know a friend who got pregnant and is very sick. I'm going to I'm going to use this example and the information I've gained in this workshop to raise awareness among my friends».

Salha Ngendakumana took the opportunity to call on parents to parents to engage in dialogue with their children on similar topics, which would surely be beneficial for all.


There is no greater shame for a woman or girl than to have her period and not have everything she needs to cover herself. Thank you for these dignity kits, only we can understand the importance of this gift more than anyone else," says Adeline Kankindi. She is a 35-year-old woman she met on Friday June 09, 2023, when the United Nations Population Fund, UNFPA, organized an event for her population, UNFPA, organized humanitarian assistance at the Sobel site in Gatumba.



This humanitarian assistance was provided in collaboration with the GBV Sub-Group coordinated by UNFPA Burundi, which mobilized around 20 partners of the GBV Sub-Group to provide assistance to this population affected by flooding caused by the overflowing of the Rusizi river. Indeed, as the situation worsened in the months of April and May 2023, led to the displacement displacement of the area's inhabitants to the surrounding hills. As a result, 450 dignity kits were offered to women and girls and girls of childbearing age to meet their most basic their most basic needs women and girls.

"I'm glad to receive this gift; we really need it. really need it. I was particularly touched to receive sanitary towels. It's really difficult during menstruation menstrual period, I often don't even go to school school and hide. The whole kit will be very useful," testifies Sarah Tuyishime, a young 15-year-old, with her dignity kit in hand in her hand.
